‘Teddy’ the lost cat searches for her owner

The Stourbridge and District Branch of Cats Protection, the national feline welfare charity, is trying to find the owner of ‘Teddy’, a black and white cat currently in the Branch’s care.

Teddy was found in the Lye area in November last year and was first looked after by a member of the public. She was taken into the Branch’s care in December when a fostering space became available.

Since then, the Branch has tried many different ways to trace Teddy’s owners but has had no luck, despite Teddy being micro-chipped.

Rob Hall, PR Officer for Stourbridge and District Branch, said:

“Teddy’s case has completely stumped us. She has been micro-chipped but, unfortunately, there are no owners details registered against the chip. Although she was found in Lye, cats are notorious for travelling considerable distances and her owners may live some distance away.

“She’s a lovely cat with a great temperament and is good with children and other animals. We feel that someone, somewhere must be desperately missing Teddy and we’d love to re-unite them as soon as possible.”

Teddy is mainly black with unusual white markings on her face, belly and paws. Vets estimate that she is approximately two years old.
